So many animals abandoned, so many left in orchards or on streets, so many injured or sick animals left out to fend for themselves, or as I have right now, four foster dogs terrified by life. Cats not being taken into shelters any longer. The list goes on.

This has been our lives for twenty-one years. Now finally New Beginnings for Merced County Animals is about to realize what we have dreamed of for all those years but was beyond our grasp—a new spay/neuter facility. When you read this, we hopefully will have just finished escrow on a property ideal for a clinic. Can you believe it is about to become a reality for Merced County? Never have we needed it more.

New Beginnings was contacted by someone who has long had a dream to have a spay/neuter clinic in Merced County. Linda Tiller reached out to me about her dream and has an ideal property for this clinic, between Atwater and Merced, directly off of the 99 Highway. Linda has given us the opportunity to purchase this land and business at a very low price. We are so grateful for her benevolence. We are filled with thankfulness and gratitude for this opportunity to prevent many, many litters of unwanted animals. Spay/neuter surgeries are not within reach of so many people, especially right now with the rising costs in our economy. Now we can offer an affordable price for people to have their pets altered.

Now, onto family-you all. New Beginnings is committed to doing this project. More than ever, we need the support of the community to make this happen. Even when it opens, we will need to continue to raise money to keep the clinic low-cost. You, our family are needed now. Please consider a significant gift toward the funding. The amount differs from person to person. I will never forget the lady who walked into Valley Animal Hospital and donated four one-dollar bills. For her that was significant.

Right now, we have \$800,000 set aside for the clinic. We will need around \$3,000,000. Sounds like a lot but we've managed to lower it from the original estimate. We want to do this well and professionally.

There are many ways to contribute. Consider including New Beginnings in your trust or a Charitable Remainder Trust to New Beginnings. Some people have donated stock and some want to donate directly. We have had a contractor volunteer some time. Have a fundraiser for New Beginnings. Also, we will be offering places at the clinic to donate towards a memorial stone or other areas. # CE 2025

For the first time since we started the Petco Love free vaccination clinics, we held one in the city of Merced, and to say it was well received is an understatement. The first people in line arrived at 7am (two and onehalf hours before we opened) and the line later extended to over two blocks long. It was a perfect day. The weather was fall-fabulous, the American Legion Hall was perfectly suited to our needs and 569 animals went home protected from preventable disease by vaccinations donated by Petco love. Quite a few also received microchips and rabies shots provided by New Beginnings.



## **TRANSPORT**

As they say, "Back in the day" we'd get all the animals loaded into the van by 5pm and then dedicated drivers would undertake a 15-hour endurance test to Oregon or Washington. Fortunately, now we have wonderful airline partners, Wings of Rescue and Dog is My CoPilot, who whisk them away on a much more pleasant 5-hour journey. On October 28th we flew 44 dogs and 8 cats to the lives they deserve in Canada and Montana. ## **MEDICAL**


This issue we have a couple kitty situations to report. The pitiful little four-week-old kitten pictured here was brought to Valley Animal Hospital by Merced City Animal Control in deplorable condition. For reasons unknown, a strip of skin and fur was missing on his neck all the way around. Bad luck changed to good when Melody, a tech at Valley, named him Rusty and agreed to foster him. In addition to bottle feeding, she needed to bring him in

daily for debridement, apply ointment and administer Clavamox. One month later the skin and fur had regrown and Rusty was reveling in his new home. Guess where! You got it—Melody's house! Her two young sons had become totally attached to his sweet, playful, trusting nature. Who could resist a rust-colored fluffball attached to your pant leg?

Now, the Persians. You may have heard about a hoarding situation discovered in a van parked at a motel in Santa Nella last June. Inside were close to 130 cats, all Persians, some already passed on, or in various stages of illness, neglect, matting and ringworm infestation. The entire lot was taken in by Merced County Animal Control. Sadly, some were in such wretched condition they had to be euthanized.



The rest have been housed at Animal Services ever since, with New Beginnings transporting them as they became healthy enough to go. Pictured here is one of the last twelve to fly and Animal Services is handling the adoptions of the remaining twenty. What an inconceivable state of affairs that was—a head-shaker to be sure. But finally, the best outcome possible.
