Our free clinics are always scheduled to operate from 9:30 am-12:30 pm. Normally, we run a little overtime to accommodate the last persons in line with paperwork. But at our first clinic of the year held in Winton on March 23, we must have been perking right along because at 12:00 we ran out of paperwork! That means we served 450 animals in just 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours! We are forever grateful to Petco Love and to Dr. Gregg and his team of techs who make this all possible. Love you guys! PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The beginning of our 22nd year! How can it be? Many years ago I stated I would do this for twenty years. What keeps me going? First, looking in the eyes of the animals who need us. Secondly, I want to be here until our low-cost spay and neuter clinic is open.

A dream finally becoming a reality! We now have a property and about \$650,000 in an investment account designated for the building. That's a nice start, but the projected cost, one we hope to lower as much as possible, is five million. We have someone who will match donations starting at one million dollars up to five million. Two other people have made commitments to fund the clinic, one of whom will make the surgeries <u>truly</u> low-cost by paying the difference between what our clients can afford and the actual expense. In addition, I have already met with a couple of veterinarians about staffing the clinic.

What do we need? YOU! We need donations, large and small. Consider a financial donation now toward the first affordable low-cost spay and neuter clinic anywhere near Merced County. Include New Beginnings for Merced County Animals in your trust or will. Have your legacy live on, continuing to help lower the numbers of unwanted animals here.

Additionally, we need a project manager. We need someone that is available to keep this moving so it doesn't get delayed unnecessarily. We have people available to serve but need one or two people who know how to manage a project as it moves through the process.

We may need an architect. Right now we are waiting to see if we can use the same ones as another group. Spread the word! Let's lower the numbers of thrown out animals, the numbers of calls we get about litters of kittens, the numbers of animals hit by cars.

LIGHTS! CAMERA! ACTION!



Something big is coming to Netflix...and it all starts right here in Merced County.

The pilot episode of a brand-new Netflix documentary is currently in production, focusing on adoption and everything that goes into saving these incredible animals so they aren't euthanized. The spotlight? New Beginnings for Merced County Animals, Merced's own grass roots, 100% volunteer-run rescue that has been doing this work for over 21

years. The emphasis? Our use of transport as it relates to adoption of the overwhelming number of dogs in California shelters.

The film crew from Random Good Films included two producers from Spain, one from New York and three other team members. For six days they essentially lived with us to document the full journey. They accompanied us at every step—crate cleaning, dog selection, health checks, loading the van at Merced County Animal Services and loading the plane on the tarmac. They followed Sharon's every move and interviewed Dr. Lauppe, Animal Services reception staff, Merced County Sheriff Vern Warnke, and Undersheriff Cory Gibson and his family, who also foster for New Beginnings. They spent time with amazing foster families, captured a canal rescue, attended the Emergency BBQ fundraiser for the three dogs that were shot and told Percy's story—a dog nearly euthanized before being adopted by the clinic director of Kitsap Humane in



Washington. Finally, they spent five days in Washington to show what happens after landing, highlighting that state's strong spay/neuter programs and community support.



But this documentary isn't just about transports. It also takes an honest look at California's overpopulation crisis and makes a powerful case for prevention through spay and neuter, showing how lifesaving action and long-term solutions must go hand in hand.

If the pilot is well received, this will become a sixpart Netflix series spotlighting adoption efforts across the country. We're honored to be the very first rescue featured and humbled that Ric, President of Wings of Rescue, had such faith in New Beginnings and Kitsap Humane that he recommended us for the pilot.

MEDICAL



You can tell that the popularity of a certain breed is peaking and beginning to go down when they start showing up in shelters. We've seen it happen with yorkies, for example. Suddenly lots of yorkies were being turned in to shelters everywhere. Currently it's French Bulldogs, known as "Frenchies." The sinister thing that occurs is the adoption of these doas from shelters, and the subsequent advertising at a huge markup on marketplaces like Craigslist.



That might have happened with a little stray Frenchie now called Jasmine. But fortunately, when she was turned into the Merced County shelter, Sharon was called and was told she would probably have her pups that night!

Because Frenchie puppies tend to have very large heads, their moms typically need to have a C-

section birth. This was performed at Valley Animal Hospital and six little babies came into the world. Unfortunately, Jasmine was not in the mood to do her motherly duties, so she and the pups were taken to Kim, a registered vet tech and bottle-feeding angel. Jasmine loved Kim, who had high hopes of training her to accept her babies, but ultimately had to resort to tube feeding. Poor little things were undoubtedly malnourished in utero and had received no benefit of their mom's nourishing milk. If anyone could have saved them it would have been Kim.

New Beginnings, with grateful nods to our medical donors, assumed the \$3,000.00 tab needed to address the conditions surrounding Jasmine's frequent vomiting. Often this occurs with incorrect breeding that results in an unduly shortened snout and windpipe. Jasmine is now at the Res-que Bully Rescue in

Reno where the scope of the problem is plainly visible; there are 27 Frenchies in California waiting to be taken in.

As if "film crew week" wasn't busy enough already, we had to have two flights that week to accommodate all the furbabies scheduled for transport. The first flight on April 1st included two of the film crew and, happily, a number of

large dogs in addition to lots of small dogs and cats. That transport carried 44 dogs and 17 cats to happy homes, and on April 3rd, 55 dogs and 60 cats also journeyed to the lives meant for them. That adds up to a whopping 176 pets that week!
